Coronavirus and the 8th Commandment

False witness, then, is everything which cannot be properly proved. Therefore, what is not manifest upon sufficient evidence no one shall make public or declare for truth... Therefore, if you encounter an idle tongue which betrays and slanders someone, contradict such a one promptly to his face, that he may blush...

- Martin Luther on the 8th Commandment

The Coronavirus pandemic has caused me to reflect upon the 8th commandment, and Martin Luther's thoughts on the same. Before I get to that, and what you and I might do with reference to it, I'd like to lay out some of the problems that we're facing as a nation. They are serious, and are worthy of our attention.

The novel coronavirus is real, and the more it spreads, the more people it will kill. It's already proven many times more deadly than the flu, and will continue to do so.

We currently have no cures, no vaccine, and no *proven treatments. Sorry hydroxychloroquine and Madagascar juice. The evidence just isn't there. But, by all means, keep trying.

The only effective tools we have for slowing the spread of this virus at the moment are social distancing, constant attention to sanitizing hands and surfaces, widespread testing, contact tracing, and quarantining those known or strongly suspected to be infected, and wearing masks when in public indoor places.

The most optimistic projections suggest that we might get a vaccine in 1 to 2 years. More conservative estimates say 4 years would be fast. Dr. Fauci has publicly stated that a vaccine may prove impossible to create, and could be ineffective due to not providing a sufficiently long enough period of immunity for its recipients. <----- Worst case.

There is a glut of mis- and dis-information on every aspect of this pandemic, muddying the waters, and making it nearly impossible for the average person to make informed decisions. Some of this deadly false information even includes a campaign against wearing masks; but wearing masks may very well turn out to be our *only hope of "opening up" and restarting our economy with a modicum of safety.

Those arguing the loudest for opening everything back up quickly overlap significantly with

those spreading and applying mis- and dis-information. For example, while they are arguing for the reopening of bars, many of the same group also spread false information regarding wearing masks, and resist wearing masks themselves when visiting recently reopened bars.

Staying shut down by way of government order for a year or more will have devastating effects on our economy, and with it human lives. On the other hand, the virus itself is likely to keep a great many things effectively shut down, government order or not.

The best science suggests that certain masks, if properly used, are effective in slowing the spread of the virus, and if widely used, would allow us to reopen more things quickly and much more safely than if masks aren't widely used. Yet, a great many people have been conditioned through false information to resist wearing masks.

So, what to do?

Should we "do nothing," and simply accept that 1% (or more) of our population, with a disproportionate number of elderly people, will die from the virus?

Should we radically reorient society, providing a universal basic income for 90% of us and universal healthcare for all of us, keeping as many things shut down as possible, and as many people working from home as possible?

Should we *mandate under severe penalty of law the wearing of masks while in public indoor places?

These are matters that will best be decided by epidemiologists and public policy makers. I have my thoughts on these things, but my main expertise lies elsewhere. It is to that main expertise that I now turn.

I begin by referring you to the 8th commandment, and Martin Luther's explanation and discussion of it. IF you haven't read Luther on this topic, please let me recommend the relevant sections in both his *Small* and *Large Catechisms*.

I'll get to the point straight away. **People need to stop spreading false information.** Period. Now, I'm not sure how this can happen without a widespread awakening of consciences. If we outlaw the spreading of false information, that can quickly become outlawing free speech. That is a dangerous road to go down, and I would advise against in the strongest terms. So, the only option we have is to demonstrate an ethical imperative. Here, I am in the heart of my wheelhouse.

Let me say this loud and clear:

It is *immoral...not merely unwise...but *immoral knowingly to spread false or even un-vetted information.

In Protestant Christian terms, it is a sin.

In Catholic Christian terms, it is a mortal sin.

In secular terms, it is a gross ethical failing.

In layman's terms, it is shameful.

If someone is spreading information about this virus and its corollary concerns that fails to rely on good scientific method, they are contributing to death from this virus, and also adding to the continued economic collapse from prolonged business closures. They are hurting society on several fronts, and thus, they are acting unethically. They are sinning. They are engaged in shameful behavior.

I know that some might say that they don't have the time or the know-how to properly research and test the veracity of all the information they share. I understand that. In that case, the ethical choice is this: don't share the information.

If someone you are in relationship with is spreading false or seriously questionable information, it is your ethical duty to point out that they are doing so, and ask them to stop (if you can do so safely). In some cases, particularly when those spreading false information are casual acquaintances **online**, you might consider whether or not it is your ethical duty to discontinue your acquaintance with them altogether, so as to awaken them to the seriousness of their error, and stem the spread of dangerous and society-destroying false information. Hear again the words of Luther: "If you encounter an idle tongue which betrays and slanders someone, contradict such a one promptly to his face, that he may blush..."

Most of us are not in a position to develop treatments or vaccines for viruses. Most of us can't influence public policy. But all of us can help win the battle against mis- and dis-information. We can all refuse to share misleading, questionable, and downright false content. We can all refuse to share content that we don't have the tools to properly judge. And we can all request that those around us do the same.

Unless we act against the societal wide rot of the rampant spread of false information, this virus will claim many more lives than it should, and the economic impact will be far more devastating than it should be as well. The unabated spread of false information is a clear and present danger in our time. We've had the answer to the problem for millenia. It's time to start applying that answer.

Income and Expenses Summary Notes:

Overall Comments and Income Review

The YTD period ending April 30, 2020, has an operating surplus of 29,000, just over \$12,000 more than at April 30, 2019, Congregational Contributions through April 2020 are almost \$8K less than contributions received through April 2019. We expected contributions to be behind during the pandemic. Building Use/Other Income has also dropped and we anticipate this will continue due to the pandemic as well. Total Income at April 30, 2020, is just over \$11k less than at April 30, 2019. Congregational Contributions are under budget by a little more than \$7k and Total Income is under budget by nearly \$9500 as of April 30, 2020. We will monitor things closely as we continue through the pandemic and adjust accordingly.

Note: Other Income includes periodic gifts made by the Thrivent Choice Donation program, clothing and paper recycling programs, and other miscellaneous unrestricted income.

Expenses Review

Total expenses were under budget by just over \$28,500 as of April 30, 2020. Total expenses YTD are almost \$29k less than total expenses as of April 2019.

Note: Benevolence payments are a percentage of contributions. Therefore, when contributions are higher, benevolence payments are higher. In 2020, we budgeted 2% for the Synod only.

The bulletin for the Sunday service is emailed each week. If you are not receiving it, please make sure the office has your correct email address and that you wish to be included in the distribution list.

I wish to thank our worship volunteers for the outdoor car services:

As of now there is no firm decision on a date when we shall return to worship indoors. You may plan on the 'car services' through June. We will address our safety concerns one month at a time. Thank you for your patience and understanding.

We are aware that there are a variety of concerns and beliefs which range from both ends of the spectrum as far as the threat of this virus is concerned. We do not want to exclude anyone on how they are able to praise our Lord.

Please be aware and bear with us when work begins on the replacement of our sanctuary roof.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

The Property Committee as well as the Worship Committee and Church Council continue to closely monitor the releases of information from the experts who are learning more about the Covid 19 virus and evaluating what the new information tells us about how we can live in the safest possible way with it. Recent information is now stressing that becoming infected with the virus from contact with a surface that has not been disinfected is much less likely than direct transmission from one individual to another by the virus contained in the tiny droplets expelled by normal speech, and certainly by coughs and sneezing. Social distance is the big key, and masks being worn protect you from those sudden unexpected close encounters with others who may be infected is essential for your safety. There are studies that indicate air movement by fans or air conditioning systems can increase the effective travel range of the tiny infected droplets so that with forced air movement the safe social distance needs to be increased.

This means that the physical comfort of being inside the building actually increases the danger and reduces the number of people who can safely occupy it. Guidelines for the effect of air movement are still being evaluated, but we know that it will increase the social distance recommendations.

Colony Roofing should soon have the materials they need to proceed and replace the roof on the Sanctuary. It appears that the weather patterns are finally swinging to a more summer-like pattern and the sun and a little drier stretch of days is just what is

needed to get underway. As soon as these elements come together and Colony advises us of their schedule, we will publish the information. The good news is that with no other events or groups using the building, the safety concerns during the work are reduced.

Our lawn care expert, Jon Williams, has now also taken on care of the exterior flower beds around the church, and just this last weekend added some needed drainage and clearing of the ditch at the south side of the cemetery property. He also removed the well from the original building at the cemetery to eliminate the safety hazard, and has begun to add soil to low areas that are making lawn care there more difficult. The recent heavy rains have saturated the cemetery soil and clearly shown where drainage needs to be improved or restored.

When the major repairs and replacement of parts of St. Paul's was built into the budget 8 years ago, the congregation was advised that a 7% increase in giving would be able to support that plan. The congregation has been faithful to their unanimous approval and allowed St. Pauls' to make several improvements that have reduced the upkeep and operating expenses for the congregation. In the November congregation meeting, the financial report showed that the level of giving has decreased about 5% in the last year, making it difficult if not impossible to continue with the annual repairs in the future years. Please prayerfully consider what you may be able to do to help offset this decrease so that we can continue to make the necessary repairs and replacements before they become a more costly emergency situation.

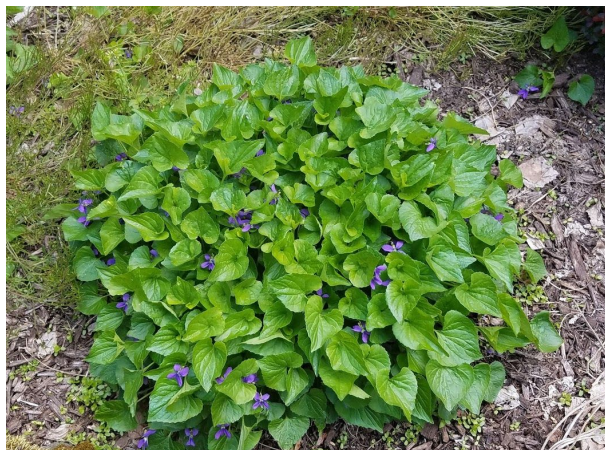

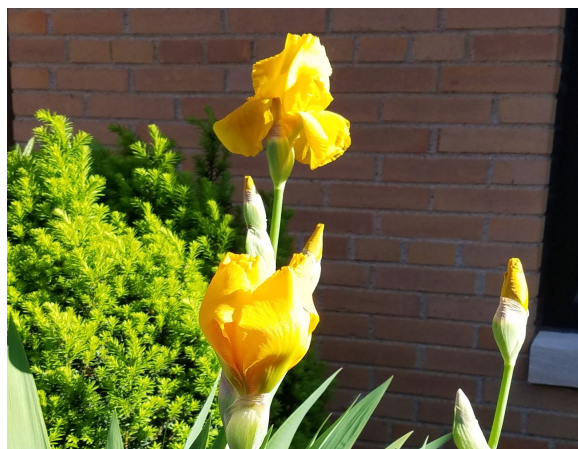

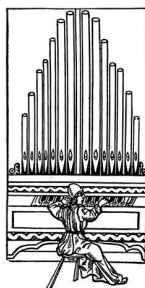

The couple has been married 40 years this June and still enjoys amusement parks. They have ridden roller coasters in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Florida.

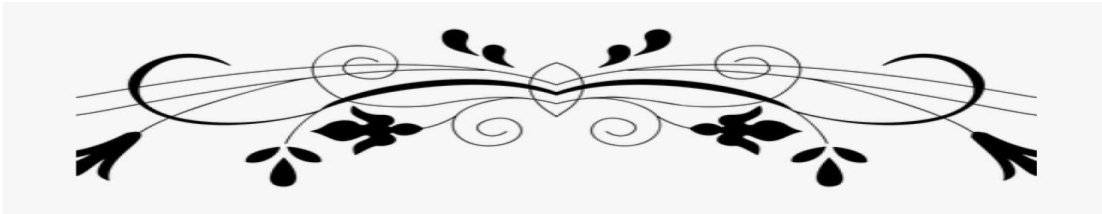

Sherrill has been singing in choirs since the age of five. She has performed in musical and dramatic theater in high school and college, as well as in community theaters.

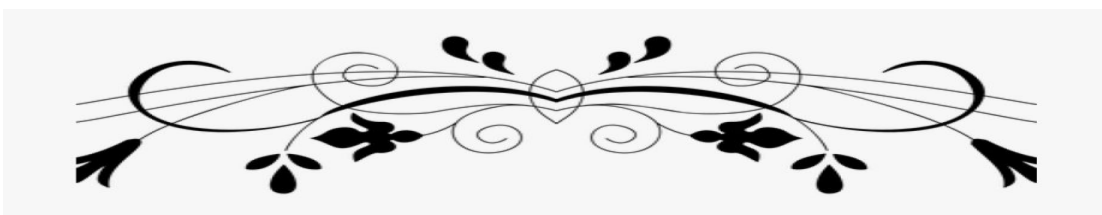
When it is time to relax Sherrill enjoys reading, jigsaw puzzles, and art/drawing. And, in case you hadn’t noticed...her favorite color is purple!

HAPPY FATHER'S DAY!

You may think that Father's Day is a modern invention, but the truth is that a Babylonian youth named Elmesu carved the first known Father's Day card in clay nearly 4,000 years ago. His special message wished his father good health and a long life. Fortunately, modern cards are a bit easier to fit in the mailbox!

Mother's Day and William Jackson Smart of Spokane, Washington were the inspiration for an official day to celebrate Father's Day in the United States.

Mr. Smart was a widower who raised his six children after his wife died giving birth to the youngest. He was a single parent for 21 years. This may not seem amazing in the 21st century, but in the 1800s it was unheard of for a man to raise children alone...and even today being a single parent of six young children is heroic!

Smart's daughter, Mrs. Sonora Smart-Dodd (Mrs. John Bruce Dodd), got the idea for Father's Day in 1909 while listening to a Mother's Day sermon at her church. She encouraged local churches to institute a Father's Day observance the following year on a Sunday in June, the month of her father's birthday. Through her efforts, interest in the celebration of Father's Day grew and spread to other cities, states and countries. She also encouraged wearing roses on Father's Day in honor of fathers. A red rose was worn for fathers who were still living and a white rose honored fathers who had died.

Many congressional resolutions proclaiming a national Father's Day in the United States were introduced through the years. President Lyndon B. Johnson recognized the 3rd Sunday of June as Father's Day with a presidential proclamation in 1966, but the holiday was not really made permanent until 1972 when President Richard Nixon signed a presidential resolution that made the third Sunday in June officially Father's Day in the United States. Many other countries worldwide celebrate Father's Day on other dates.

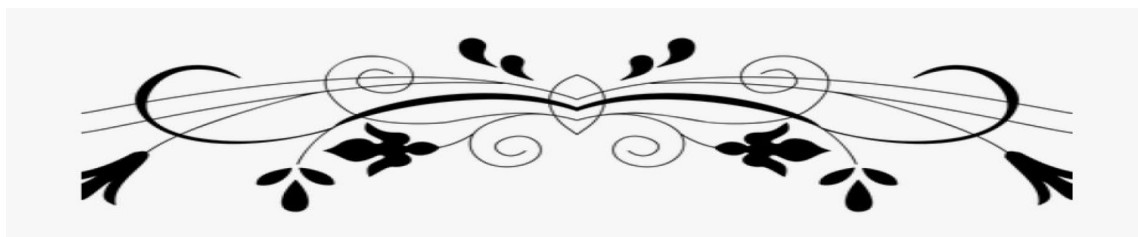
IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING REDEEMER CRISIS CENTER

1973 – Brian Haller ordained, becoming another Son of the Congregation.

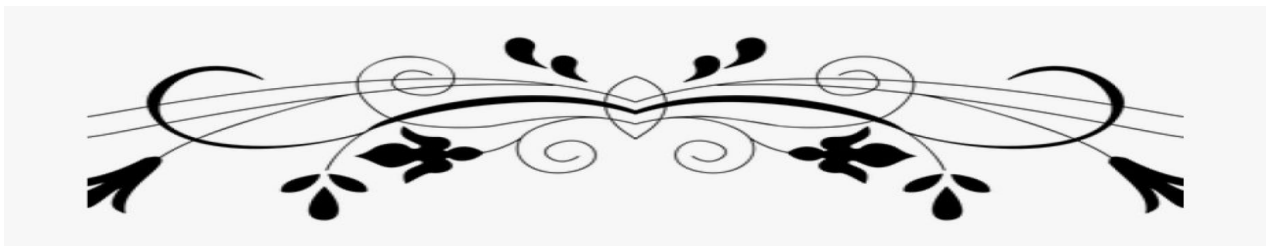
1985 – Pastor Henderson began as Associate Minister
