A Jesus Attractive to Sinners

"Now the...sinners were all drawing near to hear Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes brumbled, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them."

- Luke 15:1-2

Jesus used to attract sinners by the hundreds, and even thousands.

They loved to listen to him.

Yet, today, those whom the church calls "sinners" don't seem to be attracted to Jesus much at all.

This is a sad state of affairs, And to some in the church, a confusing one. Please, let me offer an analysis that cuts through the confusion, And a suggestion that can end the sadness.

First, an analysis, in two parts.

The church makes it a point to call certain people sinners, and push them away to keep their community pure. So, it's no wonder that certain people feel unwelcome in the church. They simply aren't.

Then, we must admit that the Jesus many churches preach sounds very little like the Jesus found in the Gospels. If he did, he would likely attract the same sorts of crowds he once did. So, again, it is no wonder that the church fails to attract certain people. They do not hear the voice of the good shepherd there.

That's my two part analysis.

Now, here's my suggestion, in three sentences.

Dear Church,

Forgive everyone everything, without fanfare.

Accept everyone just as they are.

Love everyone unconditionally.

Do this, dear church, and you will indeed attract sinners, though, as you have probably guessed by now, you'll have to start thinking of them simply as brothers and sisters, and not as defectives who threaten the sanctity of your club. You will have to welcome them with open arms, as full equals, to the table of the Lord.

Many in the church think of this state of affairs as a bridge too far.
But consider, it was the **Pharisees** who complained that Jesus received sinners and ate with them.

Here is what I can tell you.

The suggestion I've made will surely end the sadness in churches over Jesus not attracting sinners. The Jesus I have described, through the course of action I have suggested, will indeed attract sinners. But this may very well make some in the church upset.

Don't be discouraged.

It has always been this way.

The Pharisees will never be glad to receive sinners and eat with them. But Jesus is.

Go where Jesus is.
Go where the life is.
Go where resurrection is happening.
Jesus' voice is not difficult to recognize.
He says, "All are welcome here, no exceptions."

Income and Expenses Summary Notes:

Overall Comments and Income Review

The YTD period ending June 30, 2020, has an operating surplus of \$39,500, just over \$33,000 more than at June 30, 2020, Congregational Contributions through June 2020 are almost \$9300 less than contributions received through June 2019. This is the largest decline we have seen this year. Total Income at June 30, 2020 is just \$14,300 less than at June 30, 2019. Congregational Contributions are under budget by almost \$16k and Total Income is under budget by nearly \$20,000 as of June 30, 2020. Note that we have received no Building Use money since March. We will monitor things closely as we continue through the pandemic and adjust accordingly.

Note: Other Income includes periodic gifts made by the Thrivent Choice Donation program, clothing and paper recycling programs, and other miscellaneous unrestricted income.

Expenses Review

Total expenses were under budget by just over \$60,000 as of June 30, 2020. Total expenses YTD are almost \$48k less than total expenses as of June 2019. We expect to pay the roof repairs in the next month or so which is a rather large expense.

Note: Benevolence payments are a percentage of contributions. Therefore, when contributions are higher, benevolence payments are higher. In 2020, we budgeted 2% for the Synod only.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

As stated last month, the Property Committee as well as the Worship Committee and Church Council continue to closely monitor the releases of information from the experts who are learning more about the Covid19 virus and evaluating what the new information tells us about how we can live in the safest possible way with it. Recent information is now stressing that becoming infected with the virus from contact with a surface that has not been disinfected is much less likely than direct transmission from one individual to another by the virus contained in the tiny droplets expelled by normal speech, and certainly by coughs and sneezing. Social distance and masks are the big key to protecting you from those sudden unexpected close encounters with others who may be infected. There are studies that indicate air movement by fans or air conditioning systems can increase the effective travel range of the tiny infected droplets, so that with forced air movement the safe social distance needs to be increased.

This means that the physical comfort of being inside the building actually increases the danger and reduces the number of people who can safely occupy it. In order to eliminate the potential exposure due to air movement, the air conditioning in the Sanctuary will be run prior to the beginning of the indoor service to cool the Sanctuary, and then shut off before seating of participants for worship. Hopefully wearing of masks and ample social distancing will be sufficient to prevent direct transmission of the virus. As wonderful as it is to see our friends in worship again, remember not to shake hands, hug, or kiss any non-family member at this critical time when the number of new Covid19 cases has suddenly risen so dramatically.

Colony Roofing has found it necessary to reschedule the replacement of the Sanctuary roof. As soon as Property is advised of the revised starting date, the council and congregation will be informed.

When the major repairs and replacement of parts of St. Paul's was built into the budget 8 years ago, the congregation was advised that a 7% increase in giving would be able to support that plan. The congregation has been faithful to their unanimous approval and allowed St. Paul to make several improvements that have reduced the upkeep and operating expenses for the congregation. In the November congregation meeting, the financial report showed that the level of giving has decreased about 5% in the last year, making it difficult if not impossible to continue with the annual repairs in the future years. Please prayerfully consider what you may be able to do to help offset this decrease so that we can continue to make the necessary repairs and replacements before they become a more costly emergency situation.

DID YOU KNOW?

This article is meant to learn more about some of our Saint Paul staff members:

This month we will learn about Dale Hukill, our Director of Music Ministry in his own words.

Greetings. Most of you know me by the back of my head either in the balcony or in the side loft downstairs in the sanctuary. Well, I've been asked to let you know that there is another side to me that you probably don't know about, so here goes.

I spent most of my childhood growing up on the westside of Cleveland. We lived in a variety of apartments until my parents bought a small home of W130th St. when I was around eight. I attended Cleveland Public Schools and loved to sing. My father played piano by ear and when I was ten, he bought a little spinet organ, the kind with two keyboards and a short set of pedals for himself. I asked to take organ lessons and my parents relented. Thus, started my love affair with the instrument. Once a week I would finish school, take two buses to the rapid, get off at W 25th St and then take another two buses to get to my lessons. My mother would pick me up after she got off work as a nurse at what was then City Hospital (now Metro General).

We always attended church and after we moved to W130th St. we started attending the little Evangelical and Reformed Church in the neighborhood. I would always sit with Mrs. Peterjohn who loved to sing, and we would sing all the hymns and responses at the top of our voices. I was hooked on church music!

When I was twelve, the organist of the church took ill and I asked if I could take her place as organist. So, on the first Sunday of October, 1964 I started my career as a church organist.

In 1968 we moved to Circleville, south of Columbus and joined the Lutheran Church in town. I became even more involved in music, playing in the high school band and singing in the choirs at school. I would occasionally accompany the choir at church and play an occasional service. I started taking lessons with Tom Sullivan, a graduate of Curtis Institute in Philadelphia and a graduate of Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ. It was Tom who suggested I consider attending Westminster since it was one of the finest schools in the country to study organ, voice and church music. I applied and was accepted.

At Westminster I studied organ under two teachers, Mary Krimmel and Eugene Roan, both graduates of Curtis. I also had the honor to study conducting under James Litton and with Joseph Flummerfelt who besides running the choral program at WCC was the chorus master for the New York Philharmonic and founder of the New York Choral Artists. One of the best parts of attending the Choir College was performing in the Symphonic Choir with

the New York Philharmonic, Philadelphia Orchestra, Pittsburgh Symphony, American Orchestra and Boston Symphony with conductors Leonard Bernstein, William Steinburg, Seijo Osawa, Eugene Ormandy and Leopold Stokowski. We were also lucky to have many international artists visit the campus and present masterclasses and seminars while I was there.

While at college I would have a job playing and/or directing in a church in the area. This included directing five choirs in an African American Baptist church, and playing organ in UCC, Methodist and Lutheran Churches. (including a service in Slovak every Sunday morning!)

After college I lived in the Bronx and worked for a steamship company a few blocks from the World Trade Center in Manhattan and then spent the better part of a year running a midway game on the Ohio fair and carnival circuit. (Yeah, I was a CARNIE!) I ended back up in NJ and started working as a manager for a dairy farm. I ran a convenience store, much like the Lawson's of old, and that's where I met my wife who was a part time employee at the store. We settled into an apartment in the rural part of NJ by the Delaware River and I went to work for Sam Goody. We were married and two years later we moved to Cleveland.

I worked for Wendy's for a while and then took a position with a music distributor who supplied albums and 8-tracks to big box retailers like Kmart, Woolworths, J C Penney and the like. I also returned to playing in the church, first at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Brooklyn, then Euclid Lutheran Church followed by Heights Christian Church in Shaker Heights and now here at St. Paul.

My wife and I currently live in North Olmsted with a view of the metroparks valley out our front door and my hobbies are gardening and walking our dog. (No, my wife is not a hobby)

I could probably tell you a whole lot more, but I've gone on long enough already. Maybe I will do part two at some point in the future?

I will close by saying that I have truly enjoyed my time so far here at St. Paul and look forward to when we can move beyond this current difficult time and create a new and exciting future for the church.

NORTHEASTERN OHIO SYNOD ELDERLY PERSONS' ASSISTANCE FUND AND DISABLED CHILDREN'S ASSISTANCE FUND

A generous gift was given by Henry L. Howard to the LCA Ohio Synod to be used for two designated purposes: the Elderly Persons' Assistance Fund and The Disabled Children's Assistance Fund. At the formation of the ELCA in 1988, these LCA funds were distributed among the three ELCA Ohio Synods – NEOS, NWOS, and SOS –proportionally, with NEOS receiving 43.77% of the total, \$73,253.92 (or \$36,626.96 for each Fund). In 1988, NEO Synod Council chose to quasi-endow, that is, treat the amount received in 1988 as though it were not spendable and to allow use only of income added to the funds. The terms of the bequest provide that the funds remain open for additional donations, provided the donor understands that such funds will be used according to the bequest purpose.

The Elderly Persons' Assistance Fund shall exist for the care and assistance of elderly to provide them with monetary help, medical help, food, clothing, and recreation. In portions of the Ohio revised code, "elderly" is defined as anyone over the age of 60.

The Disabled Children's Assistance Fund shall exist for the care and assistance of disabled children to provide them with monetary help, medical help, food, clothing, and recreation. Children are defined as those who are under 18. The ADA defines a person with a disability as a person who has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activity.



ONCE UPON A TIME....

Since 1994, the WFTW ministry has delivered wheelchairs and Bibles in developing countries. WFTW is not simply about "dropping off a wheelchair". It is about changing the hearts, minds and lives of people. It's about transforming societies, village by village, person by person. It's about teaching about A-bilities and lessening the



stigma of physical impairments. These gifts of mobility bring hope, joy and salvation to people with disabilities around the world. Normally there is a team going somewhere in the world every 2-3 weeks year-round, however the Covid pandemic has cancelled many trips, but we need to be prepared for when travel restrictions are lifted! Each team needs 200-400 chairs to fit to recipients. That is a whole lot of chairs needed each year. Your donations will be greatly appreciated.
