But there is still time to course correct.


There is still time to repent, believe the good news, and live with purpose.

COUNCIL CORNER

Members of St. Paul,

March marks a year since we were able to gather as a congregation inside the sanctuary. A lot has changed in the past year. Who would have thought in March of 2020 that worshiping from the safety of our vehicles would be taking place? We would be broadcasting services on YouTube? The sanctuary would hold services where everyone has a mask on, and no one other than the Covenant Singers would be singing at our 11 am worship?

As we move forward into 2021, we are beginning to look at how we can unify our church from the parking lot, the sanctuary, and YouTube viewers. We know that there will be some time before we can all worship safely together, but we feel it is important to start looking at the day we all are able to worship as one. As much as we all would like to open the doors and return to normal, we know that is physically impossible. Please know that Council will not recommend moving back into the sanctuary, as our main worship site, until we are given the go ahead.

Council is also looking at ways we can be somewhat unified once the warmer weather hits. We all have been missing interactions with one another. Look for details to come as we hopefully head to warmer weather months.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

As you have probably seen, at least three new strains of the Covid-19 virus have emerged, and initial information indicates that the new strains are up to 70% easier to transmit, and at least one new strain attacks the human body with greater strength. Social distance, hand washing, and masks are still the major keys to protecting yourself, and those you love, from being infected. Now with new and more dangerous viruses on the rise, the church council has assumed the responsibility for determining what heating and ventilation systems will be operated and when. On a positive note, more and more of our youth challenged members are getting the Covid-19 vaccination shots each week so that a significant part of the congregation is now protected from a life-threatening case of the illness. The tests are indicating that the vaccine does not prevent a person from carrying and spreading the virus, so the council will need to determine when and how to begin bringing vaccinated members back into the Sanctuary for regular worship services.

Two events in the last month have property committee attention. First of all, the commercial refrigerator in the kitchen has gotten a minor leak in the refrigerant system. Service technicians are unable to locate this very slow leak. The recommendation from Survoy Refrigeration is that we simply recharge the refrigerant as needed because the cost to disassemble and repair the leak would be more expensive than the value of the unit itself. Property is now searching for either a good used or new refrigerator to replace the leaking unit that will again need charging in the not distant future.

Secondly, on February 5th the ballast in a ceiling light fixture in the church office spontaneously failed internally and produced an impressive fireworks display as well as a small fire in the fixture. Fortunately the fire went out on its own even before the Berea Fire Department arrived. The BFD checked thoroughly to insure no danger of fire was still present. The ballast in the fixture was replaced and the fixture rewired so it is operational and looks like nothing ever happened. However, this is the second fixture ballast in the office that has exploded in this manner. Several years ago another fixture did the same thing. Accordingly, we are now inspecting all ceiling fixture ballasts in the office lighting and any ballasts produced by the same manufacturer will be replaced with new ballasts.

The usual monthly reminder: When the major repairs and replacement of parts of St. Paul's was built into the budget 8 years ago, the congregation was advised that a 7% increase in giving would be able to support that plan. The congregation has been faithful to their unanimous approval and allowed St. Paul's to make several improvements that have reduced the upkeep and operating expenses for the congregation. In the November congregation meeting, the financial report showed that the level of giving has decreased about 5% in the last year, making it difficult if not impossible to continue with the annual repairs in the future years. Please prayerfully consider what you may be able to do to help offset this decrease so that we can continue to make the necessary repairs and replacements before they become a more costly emergency situation. -Jim Jungeberg

ONCE UPON A TIME....

1890 - began consideration of forming a new congregation closer to Berea due to distance to Sheldon and Eastland, and frequent flooding of the area surrounding Lake Abrams that closed access. This new congregation became the Missouri Synod church, now St Johns in Strongsville.

1967 – Ground broken for Sanctuary on Palm Sunday, Mar 19th.

1969 - Apparently in 1969 there was a consideration to *not* have the annual picnic, however, Council denied the cancellation of summertime church picnic. They also changed Communion from Good Friday to Maundy Thursday.

1970 - The youth music group, led by Bob Antl, was Named the "Good News Singers"

1972 – Call for member recipes by Women of the Church for publication in a St Paul cookbook.

1975 – Mar 26th Cornerstone at Front St church dislodged and opened

1980 - Vietnamese refugees arrived Mar 8

1992, 2001 and 2010 – Jews for Jesus shared Passover with congregation on Maundy Thursday


2001- Pastor John Vannorsdall donated wooden church bank
