Done With the Stupid Bible?

Time for a rant.

I've really had about enough from so-called "progressive" Christians, and their "done" counterparts (aggressively former Christians) who slam the Bible as shoddy literature barely worth the paper it's printed on. I'm fairly confident none of them read this newsletter, but maybe you, dear reader, can understand where I'm coming from because you've had to deal with these people, too.

Mind you, I'm not upset because they've offended my religious sensibilities, or because they've "left mother church." I don't think that you **have** to belong to a church. I don't think any harm will necessarily befall you if you reject Christianity as a framework for approaching the world. Nor do I think that you ever **have** to read the Bible.

But look, if you're going to talk intelligently about any book (or set of books), you have to at least begin to know what you're talking about. So, to be clear, I'm not offended "as a Christian." I'm offended as a student of literature.

Let's use but one example today. St. Luke says that as Jesus hung dying on the cross, darkness fell over the whole land, the sun's light failed, and the curtain of the Temple, behind which God was said to dwell, was torn in two, revealing nothing but emptiness.

It's easy to dismiss all that as magical, superstitious nonsense. That's certainly what I see a lot of former Christians doing with passages like this from the Bible.

"The sky went dark? Really? The curtain of the Temple was torn in two by an invisible hand? What a joke. Come on. These are just ancient peasants who didn't understand astronomy or even drapery."

But the thing is, Luke isn't talking about astronomy or the drapes. If you venture into the Old Testament, you will read in Ezekiel that the prophet longed for a day when the glory of the Lord would return to the Temple after the exile. And when it did, that would be the day when "the earth shown with his glory" (Ezekiel 42:2). So, when Luke writes that as Jesus died, "the sun's light failed," and the place where God was said to dwell in the Temple was revealed to be empty, he was drawing on the imagery of Ezekiel, not to discuss the literal blacking out of the sun or the tearing of the Temple curtain, but rather TO UPEND THE POPULAR INSTITUTIONAL RELIGION OF THE JEWS OF HIS DAY.

Luke isn't writing a backwards joke of a book that contradicts modern science. He didn't give a rip about modern science as it hadn't been invented yet. But even if it had been, that wasn't what he was on about. His concern wasn't the sun in the sky or the curtain in the Temple. Rather, these were **poetic symbols** that Luke employed to put a

thumb in the eye of the religious leadership and their failed system. He's saying, "When you murdered Jesus, GOD LEFT YOUR TEMPLE." Ok?

Now, it's a kind of sport these days to poke fun at the Bible, and talk about how terribly written it is. Don't get me wrong, some of it is highly problematic. We should acknowledge that. The Bible is a mixed bag. There are passages that people generally pass over more quickly, and then there are those that have made their mark on popular culture for **thousands** of years. But on balance, the documents contained in the Bible are actually very well written, highly sophisticated theo-poetics. And far more often than not, when I see someone running the Bible done, it's quite clear that they haven't tried to understand the Biblical authors on their own terms, but are rather reading through a very child-like (in this case, not a compliment) fundamentalist lens...even if they claim to reject that fundamentalism.

And look no one has to be a Christian, or even believe in God to see this stuff. They just need to do a little research on the literature they're criticizing (poorly). So before they write their next Facebook post, letter to the editor, or note to the pastor about how silly the Bible is, I wish they'd try doing a little homework first.

Ok. End of rant. Carry on.

Income and Expenses Summary Notes:

Overall Comments and Income Review

The YTD period ending May 31, 2021, has an operating surplus of just over \$40,000, \$8,600 more than at May 31, 2020. Congregational Contributions through May 2021 are down by more than \$30,000 from contributions received through May 2020. For the second month in a row, we are experiencing a nearly 20% drop in contributions. Total Income at May 31, 2021, is \$9,600 more than at May 31, 2020, still resulting from converted grant. Congregational Contributions are under budget by a little more than \$33,000 and Total Income is over budget by nearly \$6,600 as of May 31, 2021 (grant).

Note: *Other Income* includes periodic gifts made by the Thrivent Choice Donation program, clothing and paper recycling programs, and other miscellaneous unrestricted income.

Expenses Review

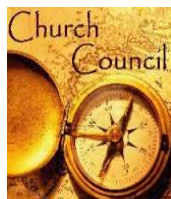
Total expenses were under budget by just over \$35,000 as of May 31, 2021, and we are nearly even with 2020 expenses.

Note: Benevolence payments are a percentage of contributions. Therefore, when contributions are higher, benevolence payments are higher. In 2021, we budgeted 2% for the Synod only.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

With a return to having services in the Sanctuary, the task of determining when we can do that with reasonable safety for all has become an even greater challenge. The Property Committee will work with the Worship Committee and the Church Council to provide a comfortable environment without unnecessarily stirring up the air in the Sanctuary. Of additional concern is that all worshippers may not have gotten vaccinated, making themselves not only vulnerable to the virus infection, but able to spread it as well. We will attempt to provide the safest possible worship environment possible. Please take advantage of your ability to be vaccinated and protect not only yourself but those around you as well.

The new office air conditioning system is operating much more efficiently and quietly and uses standard home furnace filters that are easily changed to keep the air cleaner. We have found a source with good referrals to install a reflective film to the inside of the office windows. This film will reflect the sun and further increase the efficiency of the cooling system in the office complex, as well as providing privacy from the outside of the building.

Although it is too early to provide specific plans and arrangements, the Property Committee is working with the manager of Woodvale Cemetery to evaluate the water issues and needs for restoration of St. Paul's Cemetery. Through the efforts of Dennis Mille, contact with the city councils and management have allowed St. Paul's to explore the needs and options that an expert in the area can develop for our consideration and action.

Expect to see more about the investigation and planning as options are explored.

The usual monthly reminder: When the major repairs and replacement of parts of St. Paul's was built into the budget 8 years ago, the congregation was advised that a 7% increase in giving would be able to support that plan. The congregation has been faithful to their unanimous approval and allowed St. Paul's to make several improvements that have reduced the upkeep and operating expenses for the congregation. In the November congregation meeting, the financial report showed that the level of giving has decreased about 5% in the last year, making it difficult if not impossible to continue with the annual

repairs in the future years. Please prayerfully consider what you may be able to do to help offset this decrease so that we can continue to make the necessary repairs and replacements before they become a more costly emergency situation.

Music Ministry— In Romans, we read that “faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ” (Romans 10:17). Martin Luther believed that “the church is not a pen-house but a mouth-house” (Luther’s Works, Companion Volume, p. 63). We come to know God not only through written words, but also and especially through the spoken word and song.

Two fundamentals are shared by Lutherans and other Christians in our community and throughout the world: We proclaim Scripture and we sing together. These may seem too obvious to mention, yet these profoundly shape the faith we receive and express. No single musical expression works equally well in all places or at all times. At its best, it embraces the gifts we share while being intentional about our local identity. Choices in music are influenced by many factors: history of the assembly, cultures present in the congregation and surrounding community, the musical gifts of the leaders, available voices and instruments, worship space and more.

In other words, we need to know who is willing to share their gift with the congregation so our Director of Music Ministry can craft a program that best proclaims Jesus’ message in song.

For many years, St. Paul has had a two-year catechetical program leading up to Confirmation. That seems to have worked well, and I see no reason to change it. However, I do think we might benefit from changing who teaches in that program.

In years past, the Catechism Class was led by a very small handful of dedicated volunteer teachers. This past year, I taught the class by myself. I had a lot of fun doing that, and I think it's in the best interest of the congregation that I remain a significant contributor to the catechetical program going forward. However, I also think it's important that we continue to involve others as teachers in the program as well.

What I'm envisioning going forward is this: I will teach the Catechism Classes that begin in the even numbered years, while you, my friends in the congregation, will teach the classes that begin in the odd numbered years. That means, it's your turn this year (2021-2022).

Now, I know that most of you are busy people with full calendars. And most of you aren't trained teachers, let alone trained theology teachers. So, I'm not asking that any of you volunteer to take on the responsibility of teaching for the entire year. Instead, what I'm asking of you is to consider the Catechism Class calendar laid out below, and sign up for 1 to 3 sessions. Your responsibility would be leading the children through the relevant section of Luther's Small Catechism for that particular class period, and then teaching that portion, and fielding questions from the children, based on your own experience and journey in the faith.

At the beginning of his Small Catechism, Martin Luther wrote these words: "As the head of the family should teach in a simple way to his household." In other words, Martin Luther never envisioned pastors leading the Catechism Class. He saw members of the congregation doing that, and in particular the mothers and fathers of the children. I think there is a lot of wisdom in this.

For starters, if we have a large number of teachers, our children will get to hear many different points of view. They will hear the faith presented in many different ways. This alone will teach them something very valuable.

But just as important, this will provide an opportunity for a mingling of the generations in the congregation. The children will be introduced to a large number of the adults who attend worship services at St. Paul's, and you adults will be in a position to make relationships with, and mentor the children who may just lead this congregation someday.

I'm going to start by requesting volunteers. If this looks interesting to you, please look at the schedule below, and give the office a call to sign up.

When you get your VBS Bag, I suggest you keep it until July 6 so that it will make a fun VBS week to do the projects then.

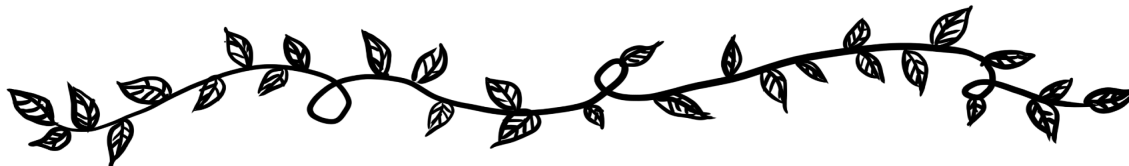
Some special notes-

WHEELS FOR THE WORLD EQUIPMENT DRIVE SATURDAY, AUGUST 14, 2021

Plan to bring unwanted wheelchairs, walkers, rollators, canes and crutches (no electric wheelchairs accepted) to the Wheels for the World Equipment Drive from 9am - 1pm on Sat Aug 14th.

This equipment, after restoration by federal prisons, are sent to other countries where this equipment is priceless. Teams of therapists and support staff meet up with the equipment for fitting to people in need. Though only a couple mission trips occurred last year due to covid, the teams are ramping up again and equipment is needed. The equipment need not be in good condition, as it will be restored, or parts used for restoration of other equipment.





ONCE UPON A TIME....

July was a very important month in our Church history, starting with the arrival of our first pastor, and a year later the adoption of our first constitution. For well over 100 years, Church Picnics were held in July, consisting of a typically abundant Lutheran potluck, hamburgers and hotdogs, along with games, talent shows, etc. Some picnics were held on church grounds, others at the North

Olmsted Park at Lorain and Porter Roads or occasionally other locations.

1866 - Pastor Fuehr, our first Pastor, arrived in NYC July 2nd

1867 - First Constitution of St. Paul's adopted and signed.

1976 - Mike Burley competed in the Summer Olympics in Montreal on the US Pentathlon team, member of St Pauls and Berea High graduate in 1971.

1982 - instituted a table for excess homegrown produce on Sunday mornings. Members brought in excess produce, other members took what they needed, leaving an honorary monetary donation that was sent to the Food Crisis Center.

1989 - Karen Ward, Daughter of Congregation starts position at ELCA in Office for Ecumenical Affairs

1991 - 125th Anniversary participation in Berea Grindstone Parade (dressed in period clothing)

2001 - Jeff and Barb Neeper returned from a 4 year mission to the Navajo at Rock Point, AZ. A Welcome Back celebration held on July 22nd.

2005 - Luther League Reunion, with Pastor Bill Wilkins and Parish Worker Della Koester as special guests.

2011 - installed secure keypad entry to outside doors

2011 - during a rain storm on July 19th it is estimated that 15000 gallons of water flooded the courtyard and came into the building, damaging the youth room, nursery and parlor.

2012 - July 29th special congregational meeting approved 15 year building repair plan

2016 - 150th Anniversary 'Big Event', Bishop Allende was our guest preacher with a catered meal following in Berea High School Cafeteria.

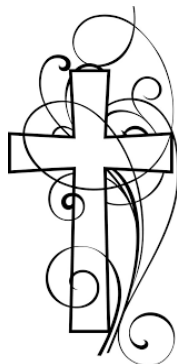

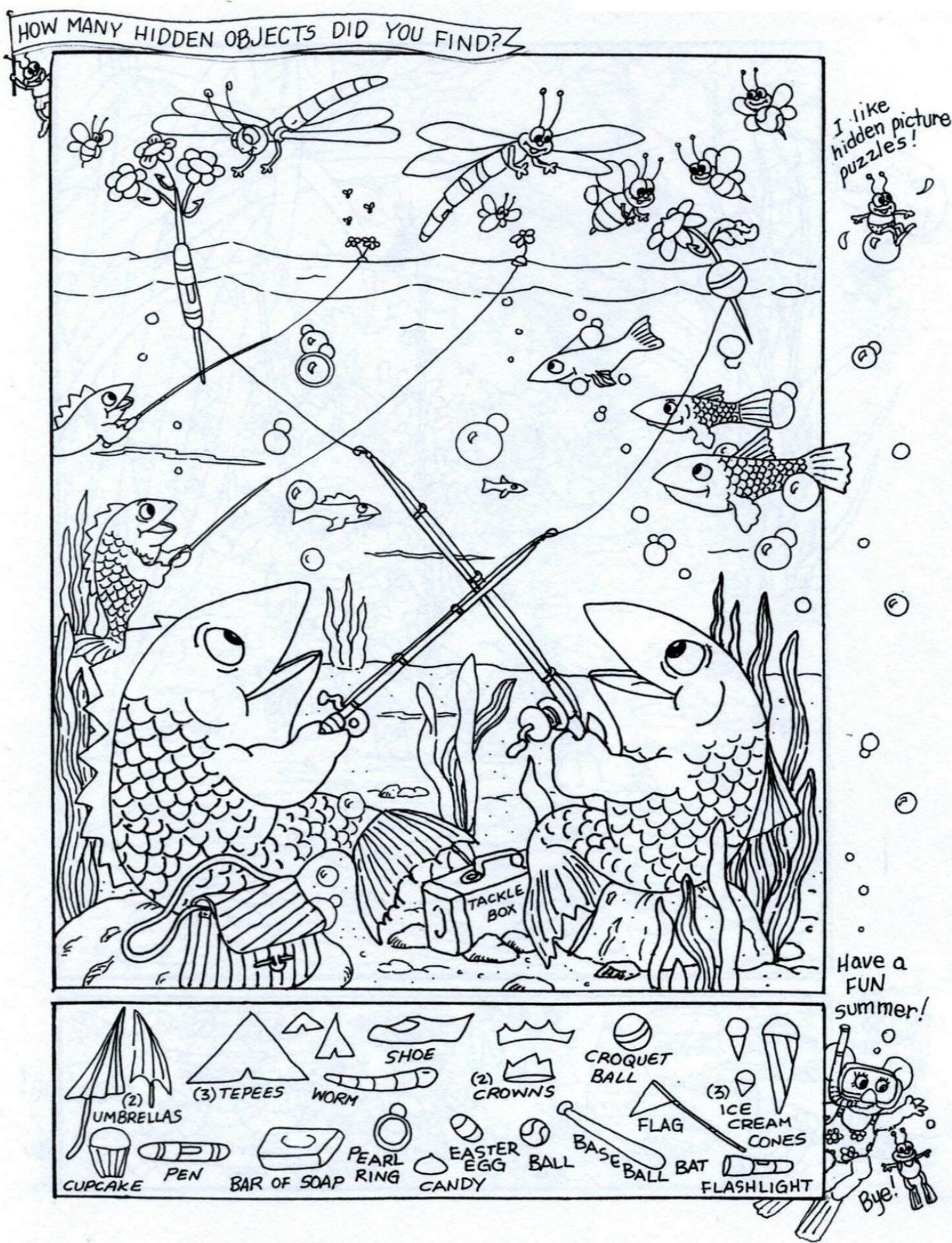


As before, pop and water will be provided, as will coolers and ice. Please plan to bring whatever alcoholic beverage you might prefer.
